



Parham's historic bells (castcirca 1299)

In 2006, Paul Cattermole, the distinguished historian of bells, inspected the bells at the church of St. Mary the Virgin in Parham, Suffolk, and was impressed with the age of the two oldest bells. He thought it likely, because of their size, shape and the lettering of their inscriptions, that they were made by John of Lynn (John de Lenne), who was at work in 1299.

The inscription on one of the bells, 'Assumpta est Maria in Celum' – 'Mary has been taken up into heaven' - is appropriate for a church dedicated to St. Mary the Virgin and quite common for the period, as is the misspelling of "coelum" (heaven). The inscription on the other bell, however, is unique in Suffolk and Norfolk: 'Veni Sponsa Mea ad Ortum Meum.' Consultation with eminent medievalists confirms that the text refers to the *Song of Songs*, the Old Testament love song which was cherished in medieval England. The words are not an exact quote from the Latin bible, which reads 'Veni in hortum meum soror mea sponsa,' translating as 'I am come into my garden, O my sister, my bride.' The inscription on the Parham bell can instead be translated as 'Come to my garden, my bride.'

It will be noted that the inscription has "ortum" for the biblical Latin's "hortum" (garden) but substituting ortum for hortum was common at the time; the Dictionary of Medieval Latin from British Sources says "see hortus" when one looks up "ortus," in addition to meanings ortus has of its own. The inscription omits "soror" (sister) from the biblical text, thus focusing solely on the bridegroom calling his bride. Medieval theologians liked to interpret the *Song of Songs* - a sensuous series of poems about two lovers - in terms of the relationship between Christ and his church, even Christ and the Virgin Mary and Christ and the human soul. So when the Parham bell rang, the intention was for it to sound as the voice of Christ, calling his beloved to his sacred place. Bells of the period were often assigned identities, inscriptions stating that individual bells were the voices of angels Michael or Gabriel or of Mary herself, "the rose of the world," as many inscriptions put it. It was more unusual for a bell to state that it rang as the voice of Christ.

The choice of a text from the *Song of Songs* assumes additional meaning when one realises that the bell was cast around the time of the marriage of Cecily de Valoines, wealthy young heiress of the manor of Parham, to Robert de Ufford, in 1297. It is possible that the couple commissioned the bell to commemorate their marriage and chose an inscription proclaiming the call of a bridegroom to his bride. Cecily was well connected in clerical circles, as her family were patrons of the nearby priory at Campsey Ashe and of Hickling Priory in Norfolk, and she could have consulted prior and prioress for advice on a suitable inscription. The bell would have been presented with great ceremony, prior, prioress and aristocracy in attendance, appreciating the reference to the Song of Songs.

Given her exalted place in medieval society and her links to learned people, it is not unthinkable that Cecily de Valoines and her husband, who was well connected at court, might have wanted the inscription to have even more depth of meaning. There is no doubt that "ortum" was a substitute for "hortum" in the inscription, but the word ortum had a meaning of its own: rising. One wonders if Cecily, her husband and their advisers, enjoyed the double meanings of "hortum" and "ortum," the latter referring to the rising of the bell, its pre-full circle ringing described in contemporary French as "à la volée" - in flight. Might there also have been a pun on the rising of the bell with the the bridegroom's rising? For this was a society in which the sensuous

and the sacred were not uncommon bedfellows, as in the Song of Songs itself.

The bell was re-hung in 2006 in a ring of 6 and readers who might want to ring it may contact the Parham tower captain, Jos Slade, on parham@suffolkbells.org.uk.

DR DAN POULTER MP

Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

This year, the State Opening of Parliament saw HRH the Prince of Wales deliver HM the Queen's speech for the first time, due to concerns around HM the Queen's health. The State Opening marks the beginning of a new Parliamentary session and the Queen's Speech set out 38 new Bills which will help the Government to continue delivering on its top priorities.

Amidst those new Bills is the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill, which will deliver planning reforms, regenerate towns and cities and shift powers down from central Government to local leaders, giving communities a louder voice and empowering them to shape their own futures.

Whilst I welcomed earlier plans to reshape planning policy, the one size approach proposed was not appropriate for Suffolk and I was very pleased to have played my part in delivering a rethink on that earlier White Paper. So, whilst the devil lies in the detail and I await full sight of the detail in the new proposed planning reforms, I am pleased that the voice of local communities will be heard as part of the new reforms. I have always taken the view that any development should be appropriate, protecting out greenbelt land wherever possible and retaining the fabric, heritage and character of our rural villages and small towns here in Suffolk. It is vital that any development should be delivered through a truly locally led planning system and communities should retain the right to shape the areas in which they live, something which this new Bill should help to enshrine in law.

I have also written recently about how rising energy costs caused by the conflict in Ukraine have reinforced the need to improve Britain's energy security. We have finally realised the importance of being less reliant upon foreign supplies for our energy and the need to improve our own energy security. The sustainable answer to securing our energy and fuel needs must come through investment in carbon neutral and renewable sources, so I welcome the proposed Energy Security Bill which will ultimately deliver a more secure, homegrown, and cheaper energy network for all of us.

I was delighted to welcome the Education Secretary, the Rt. Hon. Nadhim Zahawi, to Stradbroke where he met with Head Teachers from schools across Central Suffolk and North Ipswich. He spoke to them about his aspirations for driving up standards for all children and the increased funding which has been secured via the Schools Bill. I have long been pushing for more money for our schools here in Suffolk and very much welcome this additional investment which will help to drive up standards and help our children catch up on lost learning during the past two years.

Finally, I particularly welcome the new Mental Health Bill and hope to be able to use my own knowledge and experience as a mental health doctor to be part of the early scrutiny process in shaping this Bill, so that sensible and appropriate changes can be made to ensure that it better benefits and meets the needs of patients here in Suffolk.
